Orphanages Visitors to Minh Tam



Caroline who is the foster mother of one of the children and who supports our projects with her association "La Kermess" in Rijswijk (The Netherlands), visited Minh Tam with a group of fourteen

We had received two computers in donation from a French organisation in HCMC and we gave one to the girl. The doctor had asked us that for her. Thu Phuong was very happy to receive this gift.


internet). But today this tablet computer has become a wonderful tool, because it connects the hearts of those who can give and receive these to the amile of a shild

Projects Gia Canh

On 9 July Pierre-Yves and Laura arrive, two northern volunteers (F). Our friend Thuy welcomes them at her house for their first night. The following morning they and Marc depart at 6 (a.m.) for Gia Canh in Dong Nai province, where they meet the officials of the People's Committee.



They also meet some poor families who will benefit from our support to obtain a decent house.

In France they managed to collect the necessary money for the construction of two houses. To vary their stay, they are going to participate in a first construction in Dong Nai province for the duration of two to three weeks. The duration is defined by the climate, because it is the rainy season here. After that, they will move



to a second construction in Soc Trang Province, in the Mekong Delta.



On 24 July Marc gets up very early to take Caroline and Estelle, two students of HEC Montreal to the construction site of a house that their student association is finan-

cing. They accompany Marc to meet two families who recently benefitted from a house. They also see a house that is being constructed, before meeting Pierre-Yves and Laura who they are replacing in the house of Mrs Hoa and Mr. Minh (*on the photo*). They will start their stay with a "full" immersion because the interpreter who would accompany them is unable to attend at the last minute. But we are convinced that this will not be a problem.

Soc Trang

27 July after the construction in Gia Canh and a refreshing two day's rest in Ho Chi Minh City, the car



leaves at 4 a.m. for the Mekong Delta, with of course Marc, and Pierre-Yves and Laura. They have the opportunity to meet the provincial authorities in Soc where Marc had to finish some administrative formalities. After that they are introduced to the place where they will stay in Bo-Na village. Laura had told Marc that their first stay in Dong Nai reminded her of an episode of Peking express, this time it will be more like "Koh-Lanta" (French reality show). Marc left them in the company of mosquitoes who are crazy of joy at the thought of a feast of new blood announced for the evening.

Soon another team of volunteers will arrive to help with the construction of other houses. In a short time the construction of seven other houses will start: four in Dong Nai and three in Soc Trang.

We thank Pierre-Yves and Laura, Caroline and Estelle and their association, the other team (still to come) and all the sponsors of these houses.

Impressions of a foster mom



Can you tell something about yourself?

My name is Aline, I am 30 and I am a translator. I am from the north of France, but I live in the Jura region now with my

husband.

Since when are you a foster parent?

I foster a child with les Enfants du Dragon for approximately two years.

What made you decide to become a foster parent?

I had been thinking about it for a long time, because I wanted to give back a little bit of the luck I had received in my life. I did it when I could afford it, when I discovered the association.

Can you tell some more about what is it like to be a foster parent?

I am still learning to be a foster mother because it is still new to me. I try to show my foster child that despite the distance, I think of her and I accompany her.

Why did you choose Vietnam and the association 'the Children of the Dragon?

I was contacted by the association to make a translation. Then, I offered to sponsor a child. I preferred to do it with an association "of a human scale", that I knew.

Did you choose a boy or a girl?

A 10 year old girl.

Did you already meet your foster child?

No, not in flesh, but I had the chance to see her and to talk to her via Skype.

Will you visit her/him soon?

I would love to! It's a dream I'd like to fulfil in the coming years.

In what way do you communicate with your foster child?

On Skype, thanks to Tam who interpreted our discussion.

Can you tell us about your most moving moment?

Yes... The first question that my sponsor child asked me was: "Do you like me?" I didn't expect it at all, especially because she's quite shy in front of the camera. I was really touched. And now, it encourages me to be a little more demonstrative in my oral and written communications with her.

Do you have a tip for the other foster parents?

I should be the one to ask for advice, but I guess you have to adapt to the child while remaining yourself.

Impressions of a volunteer



Can you tell something about yourself?

My name is Trinh. I was born in Ho Chi Minh City in 1986. I graduated from University of Social Sciences and

Humanities. I am working for a Canadian Kindergarten.

Since when are you a volunteer?

I started working as a volunteer in 2009 during my study and I work for the association "the children of the dragon since April 2011

What made you decide to do volunteer work?

I believe we are all fortunate enough to lead our normal life and it is only fair to share a bit of our luck with the less privileged.

Have you been doing volunteer work before and in which country?

I volunteered for a cultural exchange program when I studied. I've been working on some charity events, giving scholarships to the less privileged.

In which country are you a volunteer now?

I've only been working in Vietnam.

Is there a difference between doing volunteer work in Vietnam or elsewhere?

Each country has its own particularities. However, I have never had a chance to volunteer in other countries. But I think in a developing country, especially in Vietnam, there are so many cases and situations that need help and support and there are so many things that need to be improved. The difficulty is to choose the one that need help the most.

Why did you choose the association the Children of the Dragon?

It was a coincidence, I heard from the association from a friend. And then I discovered the interest of the activities. Besides, the orphanage where I volunteer is the one that best fits my criteria. The place is not too near to the city in order to get easy support from surrounding people, and it is not too far away so I can come to help frequently. And the support I can provide to the kids are within my capability. So I decided to join.

What kind of volunteer work do you do? I teach English to the kids.

Can you tell some more about what it is like to be a volunteer?

My life is more meaningful when I can help someone and share a bit of my luck. From that, you realise how lucky your life has always been and you cherish more what you have.

What has been your most moving moment?

The fun, happiness and the joy the kids have never enjoyed before like children living with their parents.

What do you find difficult about being a volunteer in Vietnam?

The difficulty is choosing the ones that need help the most. Also many orphanages are driven by groups

that use kids as a tool to serve personal purposes instead of giving help to the children.

Do you want to share something else with the readers?

I believe everybody can give a hand to help others. Some can do big things, some can do small things. Your support and action, either big or small, are valuable regardless.

Do you have a tip for other volunteers?

Patience and tolerance. It is not always easy and it takes long time to see improvement. For that, helping others requires great tolerance to overcome these difficulties.
